'Enable an adult who has capacity and who is suffering unbearably as a result of a terminal illness to receive medical assistance to die at his own considered and persistent request.'

Professor John Wyatt, Consultant Paediatrician and author of *A Matter of Life and Death*, explores the moral minefield that is euthanasia, outlining and critiquing the arguments for and against PAS and discussing in-depth the ethical and Biblical responses to dilemmas in modern medicine.

20. **INTERACTIVE PRAYER WALK THROUGH THE MILLENNIUM DEVELOPMENT GOALS**

Fran Chandler, Kensington Area World Development Advisor reports on the interactive prayer walk and prayer labyrinth she has produced:

"These installations were created for a 'Make Poverty History' week of prayer and fasting at the time of the UN Millennium Plus 5 Summit in 2005. The interactive prayer journey through the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) requires a small table for each goal. Each display board carries a picture, a simplified version of the goal's

target, a start fact (the red corner pieces) and a verse from Scripture (on the yellow paper). Various relevant stories and a summary of the goal go on the table, along with instructions about an action to take.

Some actions are practical (e.g. sending a postcard), some to provoke a thought process (e.g. examine the imprint we make on this earth; to make a commitment). The prayer labyrinth, was situated in the semi-circular chancel area. In the location for which it was designed it immediately caught the eye as one mounted the steps into the church. The walk takes us through our greed and abundance, through waste and poverty and draws us before the altar to the Book of Genesis, the creation, the fall, and the curse on the earth.

“I would be very happy to loan these installations to any church which could use them alone, or in conjunction with an event they are putting on. There are still nine years to the target date for the MDGs!”

29. **CLIMATE CHANGE – TURN YOUR COMPUTER INTO A SUPER COMPUTER!**

An exciting experiment developed for the BBC by climate scientists, led by Oxford University, using the Met Office climate model.

Your computer can perform billions of calculations a second. We need YOUR help because trying to predict climate change is hard. There are lots of factors involved: air temperature, sea temperature and cloud cover all play a large part – as do dozens of other variables. Therefore there are a huge number of calculations involved.

One solution is for scientists to use the largest supercomputer they can find. But even the biggest supercomputers are only so good. We think you can do better.

Using a technique known as distributed computing, we’re hoping to harness the power of thousands of PCs around the world. If 10,000 people sign up, we’ll be faster than the world’s biggest computer. And we’re hoping to do even better than that.

All we’re asking you to do is download a simple programme which doubles as a screen saver. Once you’ve installed it, your computer will take care of the rest. You don’t have to send us anything. You don’t have to enter any data. In fact, if you decide not to set the programme as your screensaver, you probably won’t even notice it’s there. However, if you want to, you can follow the progress of your experiment on a 3D spinning globe.

The experiment works by making use of your spare processing power. All you have to do is use your computer exactly as you normally would, and the programme will run calculations in the background. When it’s done it will send results back to scientists in Oxford, who will combine everyone’s results. The more people who take part, the more complete their predictions about the future climate will be.

AND FINALLY.....: If the Earth’s population was shrunk into a village of just 100 people with all the human ratios existing in the world still remaining - what would this tiny, diverse village look like? 57 would be Asian - 21 would be European • 14 would be from the Western Hemisphere • 8 would be African • 52 would be female - 48 would be male • 70 would be non-white - 30 would be white • 70 would be non-Christian - 30 would be Christian • 89 would be heterosexual - 11 would be homosexual • 6 people would possess 59 percent of the entire world’s wealth, and all would be from the United States. • 80 would live in substandard housing • 70 would be unable to read • 50 would suffer from malnutrition • 1 would be near death - 1 would be pregnant • Only 1 would have a college education • Only 1 would own a computer. The following is a popular interpretation: If you live in a good home, have plenty to eat and can read, you are a member of a very select group. And if you have a good house, food, can read and have a computer, you are among the very elite. If you woke up this morning with more health than illness... you are more fortunate than the million who will not survive this week. If you have never experienced the danger of battle, the loneliness of imprisonment, the agony of torture, or the pangs of starvation... you are ahead of 500 million people in the world. If you can attend a church meeting without fear of harassment, arrest, torture, or death...you are fortunate; more than three billion people in the world can’t. If you have food in the refrigerator, clothes on your back, a roof overhead and a place to sleep...you are richer than 75% of this world. If you have money in the bank, in your wallet, and spare change in a dish someplace...you are among the top 8% of the world’s wealthy. If your parents are still alive and still married...you are very rare. If you can read these words you are more blessed than over two billion people in the world that cannot read at all.
