ABOUT ME

I grew up in rural N. Ireland before coming “across the water” to study law at the University of Nottingham. After legal training I felt called to social justice leading to a 20-year career in the charity sector. Alongside this I spent 10 years at St. Gabriel's, Cricklewood, a diverse (in every sense!) evangelical church, including 4 years as Churchwarden. I then had a 3-year stint as ordinand at St. Mary's, Hanwell, a “middle-of-the road” church, while studying Theology, Ministry and Mission at St. Mellitus College, where I enjoyed being Senior Student. For 15 years I had adventures with the Brent Street Pastors team, serving some of the most deprived areas in London. Following ordination in June 2026 I've settled into my curacy at St. Stephen's in leafy West Ealing, which offers both traditional and contemporary, informal services.

WHAT I CAN BRING

- Legal background, which equips me to get to the heart of complex papers
- Recent experience of discernment and ordinand training, including as Senior Student representative at St. Mellitus College
- Extensive understanding of how to identify local organisational and community need (particularly where financial support will make a difference), and provision of impactful national support through lead grant-making role at Age UK (c. £10 million distributed pa)
- Deep understanding of local/national partnership successes and tensions in federated models including Age UK, Citizens Advice and Samaritans
- Knowledge of ageing, older people and intergenerational work
- Experience and insight of staff and volunteer management and training

MY PRIORITIES

- **Ensuring clear, effective and supportive processes for those going through discernment and ordinand training** (IME 1). Recent experience as ordinand and Senior Student at St. Mellitus College provides the basis for this being my first priority. Every aspect of the training process and environment must be oriented towards developing a new generation of clergy who are fully prepared and confident to serve. Adequate resourcing of dioceses, training institutions, local churches and students and a greater degree of consistency across the country is needed.
- **Adequate funding for local parishes and clergy to thrive, particularly in areas of deprivation.** Having served in a wide variety of contexts the disparity of resourcing is startling and at odds with my experience of similar national/local models in the charitable sector. As God's people we seek to ensure fairness and justice in all we do, including in how we steward and share the resources available to us
- **Recognition of the need for deep trust and partnership between laity and clergy including supporting church leaders** (ordained and lay) in relation to staff and volunteer management. This is a key element of developing individual discipleship, protecting clergy wellbeing and ensuring future church resourcing, a learning that was made clear to me in my time as Churchwarden.
- **Focus on the building of relationships with external agencies** (health, social care, police etc.) at local level, facilitated and supported by conversations at national level. Serving as a Street Pastor demonstrated to me the power of connection with police and local authorities. This enabled a wider understanding of Jesus's love being borne out in a practical way, and **the importance of serving the whole community** in exercising the cure of souls.
- **Appreciation and care for older people within the Church alongside our efforts to grow younger.** My time at Age UK showed me that the intentional integration of different age groups allows the sharing of wisdom, the nurturing of faith and the flourishing of the community as a whole. Offering spaces to build connection helps to avoid tension between generations and builds discipleship and friendships.

OTHER IMPORTANT ISSUES

- The Church has made significant progress on safeguarding. However, a trusted culture that reflects John 13:35 remains some distance away. I support further efforts being taken to strengthen oversight and a shift to a more unified national approach on safeguarding
- I welcome the streamlining and simplification of central church structures based on my experience of local/national contexts at Age UK, Citizens Advice and Samaritans
- Unity in Christ is vital to our mission and ministry and I am committed to finding a way forward that enables all to be pastored well, including in the area of marriage and sexuality.
